Dissertation: *A Revolutionary Perspective on Social Movements: Fundamentalism in the Islamic World.*

In the last twenty years we have seen a significant surge in the number of Islamic fundamentalist movements. Some of these movements turn to terrorism, while others seek votes, and still others do both. I developed a model that helps explain the causes of Islamic fundamentalism.

Furthermore, I developed a data set that contains every Islamic fundamentalist movement found throughout the Islamic world during the last thirty-seven years, the states in which they operated, and states which funded them. I also collected the socioeconomic and sociopolitical data for every predominantly Islamic state during the last thirty-seven years. With these data, I was able to determine the causes of Islamic fundamentalism and what phenomena need to be present within the nation-state to facilitate the number of Islamic fundamentalist movements. The results of my dissertation indicated that my fundamentalist model has significant validity. To solidify my large-N results, I developed three in-depth case studies: Hamas, Hezbollah, and the Egyptian Muslim Brotherhood.

Over the last thirty years Islamic fundamentalism has become a permanent and unwanted fixture in our lives. It is imperative that we understand what is facilitating and fueling its continued success, be it through electoral politics or through force. There is no consensus as to what has caused the rise of Islamic fundamentalism or an explanation as to why some fundamentalist movements are successful and manage to acquire significant state power while others do not. There is no explanation as to why some Islamic fundamentalist movements obtain their power through democratic means and others through force. My book provides a systematic explanation to these questions while furthering the national discussion and debate we must have.

My intent is to facilitate an understanding of this growing phenomena that has reached our borders, that threatens every American, and that since September 11, 2001, has killed tens of thousands of American citizens. My goal in writing it was to create a readable, understandable, and comprehensible explanation of Islamic Fundamentalism and not just its causes and objectives, but also an explanation as to why individuals vote for them, join them, support them, and commit violence in their names. Specifically, we cannot comprehend why or how ISIS continues to grow, gain popular support, and achieve significant success at spreading its control over massive segments of the Islamic world. Their objective is the creation of a global Caliphate and ultimately the elimination of the United States. With that being said, my book eliminates our national naiveté.

This volume will be a collection of fifteen different perspectives on how to resolve the many different types of contemporary international conflict in the new neo-realist world-order. Each chapter is a different perspective and written by a different scholar.

Berna, Dustin. “The Causes of Islamic Terrorism: A Quantitative Analysis” (Chapter 7 in *International Conflict Resolution*):

This chapter determines, through the application of quantitative analysis, the causes of terrorism (also suicide terrorism) what phenomena exist/do not exist within majority-Islamic nation-states that facilitate terrorist (also suicide terrorist) attacks. The dependent variable is the total number of fundamentalist movements within the state and my preliminary results indicate that there is no relationship between a state’s degree of fundamentalism (total number of fundamentalist movements) and the total number of terrorist (also suicide terrorist) attacks.

Anthology of Islamic Fundamentalist Movements (tentative contractual agreement with Praeger Publishing House to follow the Encyclopedia of Islamic Fundamentalist Movements when finished):

I am proposing an Islamic fundamentalist movement anthology that will be broken down into 9 chapters, each representing an Islamic nation-state and an in-depth historical, biological, and ideological explanation of all fundamentalist movements in operation there. My proposed book, *The Islamic Fundamentalist Anthology*, will serve as a core text across interdisciplinary fields. Primarily, this book will enhance the ongoing discussions concerning Islamic fundamentalism, Islamic studies, terrorism, national security, Middle Eastern politics, and political science. Political scientists, historians, practitioners, governmental agents, and sociologists will also benefit from the conceptual frameworks used to articulate and invariably define and explain the many types of Islamic fundamentalist movements. This book would be the first of its kind. Another goal of the book is to spark the interest of fellow academics and encourage further debate and research into the study of Islamic fundamentalist movements.

“American Capitalism: The Facilitator of Islamic Fundamentalism.” (Submitted to the *American Review of Politics*): What the United States policy makers have yet to understand is that the implementation of American capitalism in the Islamic world has resulted in significant hostility; specifically the rise of Islamic fundamentalism. The “survival of the fittest” mentality inherent in capitalism runs completely counter to the foundations of Islam. As a result of American hegemonic (militaristic and economic) domination spreading its rigid class system and capitalist values in areas that are majority Muslim, an ideological based conflict has emerged that has engulfed both cultures. This article evaluates the inherent incompatibility of American capitalism and Islam. It is becoming extremely difficult to determine the point of demarcation between international relations and comparative politics and no phenomena blurs this point more than the rise and actions of Islamic fundamentalists.

“Al-Qaeda and ISIS the New Epistemic Communities” (Expected to be finished Fall 2016): Epistemic communities facilitate learning, negotiation, ideological development, and they deepen individual and collective societal knowledge on specific issues. The epistemic community’s authority is the result of their recognized expertise and their ability to influence policy, just as al Al-Qaeda and ISIS do.

“Iranian Political Institutions and the Rationality of Nuclear Weapons.” (Expected to be finished December 2016): this article looks at the institutional and military restraints of President Ahmadinejad and the rationality of Iran’s nuclear program.

Why They Hate Us: This is a book length study whose objective is twofold. First, it is to develop an easily understood explanation of the causes of Islamic fundamentalism. Secondly, I intend to evaluate U.S. foreign policy toward Islamic nation-states and explain what it is about our foreign policy that is fueling the animosity both fundamentalists and everyday Muslims have toward the United States. The case studies would include: Iran, Iraq, Saudi Arabia, Lebanon, Palestine, Egypt, and Al-Qaeda.
